Nuclear Reform Monitoring Committee

Results of Monitoring the Progress of the Nuclear Safety Reform Plan
- Findings of the Nuclear Reform Monitoring Committee reported to the
TEPCO Board of Directors -

The Nuclear Reform Monitoring Committee (hereinafter referred to as, “Committee”) was given a report by Tokyo Electric Power Company (TEPCO) on the progress of the Nuclear Safety Reform Plan and other matters at the 9th Nuclear Reform Monitoring Committee meeting held on August 24, 2015. From the perspective of the Committee, TEPCO’s nuclear safety reform efforts are being implemented throughout the organization from upper management and nuclear leaders to plant managers and workers.

Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Station (NPS)

1. TEPCO has shown substantial progress with contaminated water management at the Fukushima Daiichi NPS through the completion of the treatment of highly radioactive contaminated water that was stored in tanks and the removal of contaminated water from the seawater trenches. In addition, with the progress of stabilization efforts, TEPCO has taken a significant step in the transition from emergency handling to decommissioning.
2. The Committee deems TEPCO’s commitment to fulfilling its goal to society in regard to contaminated water countermeasures and efforts to disclose clear information as evidence of steady progress with nuclear safety reform.
3. In regards to information disclosure and communication in the wake of the channel K drainage information disclosure problem, TEPCO has begun disclosing all radiation data measured at Fukushima Daiichi and is continually making improvements while listening to the opinions of various stakeholders. The Committee has also confirmed that TEPCO has a strong desire to clarify the

responsibilities of, and enhance cooperation between, the departments involved with these issues based on the results of the investigation by the Information Disclosure Subcommittee established by the Committee.

4. TEPCO management and nuclear leaders have taken the recent fatal accident at Fukushima Daiichi seriously, but the Committee still needs TEPCO to reaffirm that workers in the field at Fukushima Daiichi have renewed the company's efforts to ensure safety.

Kashiwazaki Kariwa NPS

1. In addition to self-assessments, TEPCO has also invited the IAEA to Kashiwazaki Kariwa to perform third party review with regard to company operation and management as well as the level of nuclear safety culture. Its efforts were praised by the IAEA during the recent Operational Safety Review Team mission and the Committee was informed that TEPCO was taking immediate action in response to suggestions from the reviewers.
2. The Committee requests TEPCO to consolidate and review its activities since the Fukushima Accident on March 11, 2011 and report the results at the next Committee meeting. The Committee plans to visit Kashiwazaki-Kariwa NPS in November to directly monitor the progress of these activities.

Nuclear Safety Culture

1. The Committee commends TEPCO's corporate management and nuclear leaders for their efforts to enhance safety awareness within the organization by engaging in dialogue with employees and contractors from plant managers to workers, as well as conveying its expectations for nuclear safety through various channels including the intranet and distribution of written safety information.
2. At Kashiwazaki-Kariwa NPS, emergency response drills were conducted and the lessons learned from those drills have led to the enhancement of technical skill and improvements in daily duties.
3. In consideration of the recent fatal accident, it is important to further raise safety awareness among those who engage in the work, including contractors as well as the corporate employees. The Committee expects that TEPCO and contractors will work together to quickly construct a mechanism for compiling and analyzing accidents and near misses in an effort to prevent recurrence.
